Why Are Barrier Islands Important? (from Readworks.org)

An island is a piece of land surrounded by water. Islands are located all over the world in oceans, rivers, and lakes. Barrier islands are special. They are located in the ocean, near the mainland. One area where barrier islands can be found is in the Gulf of Mexico.

Barrier islands can form in different ways, depending on the area. In the Gulf of Mexico, ocean waves push dirt and sand toward land. Some of the dirt and sand gets pulled back as waves pull back from the beach. When enough dirt and sand get pushed to the same spot, a barrier island forms. Through this process, barrier islands can change and even move.

Barrier islands are important to wildlife. Marine animals like oysters, crabs, and shrimp may live along the islands. Birds like pelicans, terns, and gulls live on the islands and raise chicks. Migrating birds depend on the islands too. Barrier islands are also important to people. The islands help protect the mainland from big storms. The islands actually absorb energy from storms. When the storms arrive on the mainland, they have less power and do less harm. But sometimes, big storms such as hurricanes destroy barrier islands. That can be bad news for animals and for people.

Along the coast of Louisiana, some barrier islands are in trouble. These islands were first formed partly by dirt and sand that came from the Mississippi River. The Mississippi River flows into the Gulf of Mexico. It used to push dirt into the ocean, also. But after big storms caused flooding in the city of New Orleans, engineers worked to change the flow of the water. The changes they made have helped stop some flooding. But the changes also keep dirt from flowing from the river into the ocean. Now, there's less dirt for the ocean waves to move. As a result, some of the barrier islands are disappearing. This worries the people who live along the coast. These people understand that barrier islands protect the mainland. If the islands all disappear, the coast will be in more danger when big storms happen.

People are working to add dirt and sand to some of the islands in the area. The ocean will keep moving dirt and sand along the barrier islands, too. With the

people's help, the ocean will have more dirt to move. The islands will remain in place, doing their important work. The birds and marine animals will continue to have homes. And barrier islands will keep protecting the coast.
